### Dean's Letter

February is Black History month—a time to explore and celebrate the history and contributions of African Americans and other cultures of the African diaspora. Many of us don't have a deep knowledge or familiarity with music written by black composers for the organ. We have two great opportunities this month to fill in that gap.

Dr. Roy Belfield Jr., Director of Music Ministries at Towson United Methodist Church, will present a lecture recital on organ music of Black Composers



Roy L. Belfield, Jr., a native of Petersburg, Virginia, began his undergraduate studies in music at Dillard University in New Orleans, Louisiana. He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in music from Morehouse College in Atlanta, Master's degrees in music education and organ performance from Florida State University in Tallahassee, and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in organ performance from the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music. He has done additional studies in vocal pedagogy and choral conducting at the University of Alabama, Pennsylvania State University, and the University of Southern California. Belfield has studied choral conducting with David Morrow, Rodney Eichenberger, Scott

Anderson and Lynn Drafall, and piano with Marilyn J. Breeden, Buckner Gamby, and Moses Hogan. His principal organ teachers have included Carl G. Harris, Jr.; Clarence E. Whiteman; Herman D. Taylor; Joyce F. Johnson; Michael L. Corzine; and John Obetz.

In this recital, Robin partners with pianist **John Henderson** to offer **Songs of Dissent** — a stunning program of American art song featuring **Civil Words**, Pulitzer and Grammy-winning composer **Jennifer Higdon**'s 2015 song cycle setting texts from the American Civil War. Also included are powerful songs by **Charles Ives**, **Samuel Barber**, **Kurt Weill**, and a work of Baltimore-based composer **Max Eidinoff**. To close the program, Robin sings **Stacy Garrop**'s mesmerizing song, **My dearest Ruth**, which sets Marty Ginsburg's final love letter to his wife — and American legal icon — former Supreme Court justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg.

Compline is a simple office including a confession of sins, one or more psalms, a short reading from scripture, versicles and responses, the Lord's Prayer, collects which ask for God's protection during the night to come, and the canticle 'Nunc dimittis.' This ancient service is sung by a schola cantorum in the darkness of candlelight and lasts approximately 20 minutes. Reception will follow.

LIGAMENT presents a program of new works for voice and double bass which explores the vast sonic worlds made possible by this duo's unique instrumentation.

Featured on this performance is Nick Bentz's *please continue*, which examines the relationship between psychedelics and American culture by setting drug trip reports from the turn of the century alongside words from John Erlichman, Nixon's policy advisor, and electronic manipulation of presidential speeches from the Nixon administration to the present.

In comparison, Ruby Fulton's *and if not, why not* reveals the isolating effects of interstate migration on new mothers in early 20th-century America.

The surprising combination of double bass and voice brings a new and exciting world of sound to the pressing and political pieces on this program.
