Sunday 1 October, 8p Compline Grace & St. Peter's Episcopal Church (707 Park Avenue, Baltimore, MD, 21201)

Compline is descended from the night prayers said before bed at the end of the monastic round of daily prayer. Compline is a simple office including a confession of sins, one or more psalms, a short reading from scripture, versicles and responses, the Lord's Prayer, collects which ask for God's protection during the night to come, and the canticle 'Nunc dimittis.' This ancient service is sung by a schola cantorum in the darkness of candlelight and lasts approximately 20 minutes. Reception will follow.

Sunday 8 October & Monday 9 October Peabody Organ Conference Various Locations

Three former Peabody faculty artists had an incredible influence on the organ world and organ building - Virgil Fox, Arthur Howes, and Donald Sutherland. In recognizing their contribution to the field of organ study, this conference features recitals on the organs with which they were associated. Lectures about the teachers and their pedagogy, as well as a study of the instruments, will display the diverse styles and approaches to the organ in the 20th century. This retrospective will guide us as we also envision pedagogy of organ and sacred music in the 21st century.

Performances will take place on three iconic organs - the beautifully restored Skinner organ at Brown Memorial Presbyterian Church, where Virgil Fox created his famous arrangement of "Come, Sweet Death;" the Fisk-Flentrop organ at Mount Calvary Catholic Church, which sparked the career of Charles Fisk; and the Holtkamp organ at Peabody Conservatory, which is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year. Performers include Marvin Mills, Jonathan Moyer, William Porter, John Walker, and Janet Yieh. Presenters include Michael Hart, restorer of the Skinner organ at Brown Memorial; Chris Holtkamp, President of the Holtkamp Organ Company; Andrew Johnson, the inaugural winner of the OHS Weaver Prize in Organ Scholarship; Doug Marshall, student and protégé of Virgil Fox; and an interview with Donald Sutherland.

Join us as we celebrate three faculty artists who made long-lasting contributions not only to the Peabody Organ Department but to the world of organ design and performance.

Do you have questions related to your profession? Or, do you have questions related to the organ? Examples might be choir issues, repertoire advice, organ literature questions, advice on purchasing a new organ for your church or on fundraising for your instrument, musical ideas for a special non-liturgical service, or wondering what organs to be sure to see when traveling to another country.

Perhaps you would rather not search your question online nor inquire on social media platforms but you might instead (or additionally) prefer to reach out to the accrued wisdom of your Baltimore Chapter colleagues. If so, we have a solution.

Members can email their question to current coordinator, Diane Luchese, (<u>dluchese@towson.edu</u>) along with their specified preference from these options:

- OPTION 1. Your question will be forwarded (without your name) to the BAGO list. Members reading your question who have something to share will email their responses to the coordinator. When the replies are gathered, the coordinator will send the compiled suggestions back to the person who requested some help. Additionally, if anyone else in the community sees the question when it is circulated and has a similar question and/or would like to know the solutions regarding the same issue, they too can write to the coordinator, requesting that they also get a copy of the responses.
- OPTION 2. If you have a question and complete anonymity is not critical and/or you might even want some follow-up dialog exchange with mentors on the issue, begin by sending your question to the coordinator. Your question will go out to the community at large (anonymously) in the newsletter. Any member who sees your question and would like to help will contact the coordinator, after which they will be given your contact info to exchange with you directly and independently.
